Principal's Report

What a big week!

This week our classes were out and about for Science week and our HASS (Humanities and Social Sciences) units.

Our Upper Primary classes attended the Science Fair at Clare Town Hall on Tuesday, learning all about Planets.

On Wednesday our Foundation / Year 1s and our Year 6/7 classes headed off to Adelaide to visit Good Shepherd Lutheran School at Para Vista and Parliament House (respectively). Ms Parker's class are learning about living things and what they need to grow. We know that plants need air, sunshine, water and soil to grow, but our visit challenged that understanding when their Principal Mr Wilksch told us their plants grew with no soil. Not only that, but they grew three times faster in their eco system and got their food from fish poo! At Good Shepherd, they have focused on Sustainability and have an aquaponic system to grow vegetables which they on sell to local businesses. Their Senior students are all involved in either production, marketing or sales, and with their environmental initiatives of solar panels and rainwater tanks, they produce their vegetables almost cost neutral with their only spending being on fish food! Our Foundation students were able to see how the plants grew in this system and examined their plant roots with magnifying glasses. They looked closely at the different leaf structures and saw the different fish tanks with rainbow trout and silver perch of different sizes. We learnt some amazing facts including that rainbow trout eat half their body weight each day! Imagine if we did that!

We then joined the Junior Primary classes for two of their lessons and made new friends. We thank Mr Wilksch and the Good Shepherd Community for allowing us to visit and join in their learning. It certainly stimulated a new layer of questions and built on our prior learning.

The Year 6/7s were taken for a tour of Parliament House in Adelaide by our local member, Mr Geoff Brock. Mr Brock is a good friend of our school and regularly visits us (most recently sitting in as King in our Student Parliament Open session). Mr Brock was terrific with our students and gave lots of interesting information as he showed us through one of his workplaces. This fits in with our Civics and Citizenship HASS unit and is a precursor for our Canberra Camp in October, where we will visit Parliament House also.

Yesterday every class visited the Science Fair in Clare Town hall with lots of experiments and activities. Again we were amazed by the different experiments and science facts being presented.

So why do we go on excursions? I'm glad you asked (3)
All of these excursions provide hands on and real life opportunities for our children to experience the concepts

they are learning about and they stimulate curiosity, new questions / wonderings and promote deeper thinking. We know that we learn by doing, and through these excursions we are able to make connections to what we already know and see how our new understandings are applied in different contexts. Even at 5 years of age, children are able to ask deep questions when they see and experience big concepts in their real life example, as we heard at Para Vista when a child asked Mr Wilksch whether there are any plants which can't grow in an aquaponics system and why. As we see in almost every real life learning experience, our students were highly engaged, curious to find out more (even after we came back) and eager to share what they had seen and discovered. Their excitement is contagious and we can see their learning is rich!

I would like to thank our staff and accompanying parents who organise and come along with us. Your efforts are valued and enable us to Educate Nurture, Inspire and Grow.

Year Foundation/Yr 1 Visit to Good Shepherd Lutheran School Para Visit

On Wednesday the Foundation/ Year 1 class and the Year 6/7 class ventured down to Adelaide for a day of learning.

The Foundation/ Year 1 class visited Good Shepherd Lutheran School at Para Vista to explore their new Aquaponics system and spend some time with their Stage 1 classes. The Aquaponics system allowed the students to make connections about living things in a different situation. It highlighted the interdependence between many living organisms in one environment. The students thoroughly enjoyed interacting with the fish who's bi-products keep the entire system going and fertilise all the produce they grow and distribute.


Year 6/7 Class Visit to Parliament House



Science Week

This week the school has actively participated in a number of different activities. These have included the StarLab experience, an excursion for the F/1 class looking at living things (Horticulture and Aquaculture) and a 'Science Magic' show (F-3) and 'Fire and Ice' show (4-7).

StarLab

On Tuesday the Year 4-7 students went to the Clare Town Hall for the 'StarLab' experience.









As we walked in we saw a big blue inflatable igloo. Many of the students began to wonder what could be in there and how can we all fit in there. The igloo was spherical like the night sky. On the igloo they were able to illuminate many different graphics to do with the Solar System.

The students were amazed at the many different aspects we were able to see up close including the stars and the different constellations, how the sky changes from summer to winter, you can use the Southern Cross as a compass, what a nebula looks like, and how the planets look up close.

The engagement of the students was fantastic and the wonder of what was around them had them captivated.

SciWorld Shows

On Thursday all classes visited the Town Hall to witness some fantastic educational, and at times explosive, science shows. Sciworld shows are set to engage their audience while also providing them with information about what is happening in the experiment and why/ how it happens.

'Science Magic' explored the magic of science, captivating the students imagination and awe and demonstrating what science is all about in a friendly way. It was a show of wonder.

The **'Fire and Ice'** show delved into the more technical, using scientific language and exploring reactions of elements and the make up of materials. How we can see, hear, smell and feel the different reactions and most importantly how to do this safely!









PREMIERS READING Challenge


